Intellectual framing

- Different “waves” of digital humanities:
 - 1st wave: computational humanities wave (driven by small community of programming scholars, mainly computational linguists)
 - 2nd wave: big expectations wave (revolutionary rhetoric of game-changing nature of digitization; large scale digitization; building of tools / datasets)
 - 3rd wave: critical / reflexive wave (acknowledging both the possibilities and limitations or biases)

Creation and strategic positioning of C²DH is embedded in 3rd wave of digital humanities

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- Challenge: To face the growing gap between the fast development of new techniques and tools for doing digital humanities and the rather slow appropriation and critical reflection of such tools and techniques by the academic community
- The "update" of classical hermeneutics (Schleiermacher, Dilthey, Heidegger, Gadamer, Ricoeur, Habermas) to the digital age requires a thorough investigation on the technical, infrastructural, and digital environment in which we produce historical evidence, develop historical arguments, and construct historical narratives.

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- "classical" hermeneutics:
 - concentrated on the philosophical or sociological conditions of possibility to produce evidence-based arguments ("truth", "objectivity") in order to "understand", not to "explain" (Wilhelm Dilthey)
 - Philosophical hermeneutics as pragmatic theory of knowledge (Gadamer: Truth & Method): what can we know, under what circumstances and with what validity?
 - Central lessons:
 - Absolute historicity of all knowledge (impossibility of absolute truth)
 - Contextual dimension of knowledge production & appropriation
 - Interest driven nature of cognition & insight
 - Understanding as dynamic process (Serres: randonneur)
 - Tension between "strangeness" and "familiarity": the in-betweenness is the true space of hermeneutics

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- digital hermeneutics:
 - Tension between “understanding” and “explaining” in Dilthey’s conception of hermeneutics resurges in the age of big data
 - *Methodological tensions:*
 - Tension between “quantitative” and “qualitative” research
 - Tension between “distant” and “close” reading
 - *Epistemological challenges:*
 - Tension between “statistical evidence” and “historical relevance”
 - Tension between “exemplary” versus “representative” research designs

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- To deal with those tensions, we need:
 - new heuristics of “in-betweenness”
 - true interdisciplinary skills
 - multimodal literacy
- New conception of academic training / curricula
- Generational challenge: train the trainers!

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- Digital hermeneutics as heuristic of “in-betweenness”:
 - „Trying to locate a hermeneutics at the boundary between mechanism and theory (...) Algorithmic criticism proposes that we channel the heightened objectivity made possible by the machine into the cultivation of those heightened subjectivities necessary for critical work“.
 - Stephen Ramsey: *Reading Machines. Toward an Algorithmic Criticism*. University of Illinois Press 2011, p. x.

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- Need for multimodal literacy & hybrid practitioners

“We need database literacies, algorithmic literacies, computational literacies, interface literacies. We need new hybrid practitioners: artist-theorists, programming humanists, activist-scholars; theoretical archivists, critical race coders. We need new forms of graduate and undergraduate education that hone both critical and digital literacies. We have to shake ourselves out of our small, field-based boxes so that we might take seriously the possibility that our own knowledge practices are normalized, modular, and black boxed in much the same way as the code we study in our work.”

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- Reflexive wave:
 - In using software, apps, databases, digital meta-sources, the digital humanities scholar (the experimenter) actively co-constructs his “epistemic object” (Hans-Jörg Rheinberger)
- Kranzberg law: “Technology is neither good, nor bad, nor neutral”.
 - Ergo: we need to reflect on the “non-neutrality” of the technologies / infrastructures involved in our research
 - Ergo: we need to open up the “black boxes” we are using in doing our research!

Inside the Trading Zone of C²DH

Intellectual framing

- Open up the black boxes = battle call of Science, Technology & Society Studies (STS)
- “The infrastructures of the digital humanities are, like all the best infrastructures, simultaneously omnipresent and invisible. The digital humanities depend on and operate through a vast, interlocked network of objects, capital, people, and ideologies: ASCII code; fiber-optic cables; tenure lines; server farms; research centers and literature labs; wage laborers and graduate students who scan, attach metadata, and program search functions”.

Intellectual framing

- How to “grasp” the epistemological impact of hidden / black-boxed digital research tools and infrastructures?

By putting our hands and heads on!

„Grasping or comprehending reality becomes a double act that also involves gripping on it: ‚comprehending‘ reality in linguistic – theoretical terms, and ‚grasping‘ it through efficiency; the intellectual and the technical form“.

Intellectual framing

Thinkering

- bringing „thinking“ and „tinkering“ together! (Erkki Huhtamo)
- aim: to turn the „explorative mode“ of distant reading into an „experimental mode“ of knowledge generation
- playful mode of cognition: “heuristic groping” (Olaf Breibach et al.)
- The experimental / playful mode of knowledge production produces what Dilthey had called “Bildung” – it combines problem-based theoretical thinking with personal experience

Intellectual framing

Thinking

“Thinking” – composed of the verbs “tinkering” and “thinking” – describes the action of playful experimentation with technological and digital tools for the interpretation and presentation of history. Finding new historical insights and innovative forms of narrative are at the centre of the C²DH’s activities.

THINKING Using Digital Tools to Generate Subtitles for a Radio Play

Pragmatic framing

Favourable ecosystem for C²DH in Luxembourg

- Window of opportunity: new Government 2014 (creation of IHTP in coalition agreement)
- 2019: new ministry of digitalization: promote “Digital Letzebuerg” strategy
- Creation of C²DH as third Interdisciplinary Centre of University: contemporary and digital history as one of 8 research priorities of UL in P4 (2018-2021)
- National Funding Agency for Research: will include DH in new funding priorities (2020-2030)
- “Business model”: private/public or public/public research projects: combining fundamental research in contemporary & digital history with new public history outputs

Challenges & Opportunities

Pragmatic framing

Still some challenges...

- How to turn “theory” into practice? Creating C²DH as experimental space for interdisciplinary collaboration (“trading zone”) has been realized physically/institutionally, but how to promote / realize “interactional expertise” in practice?
- P. Gallison / H. Collins: different types of trading zones, depending on different forms collaboration and communities of practice / epistemic traditions
- At C²DH: main challenge, to facilitate / institutionalize collaboration between humanities scholars and computer or data scientists
 - How to develop a “common ground” / “inter-language”? Skills trainings / co-design of research projects
 - Fickers / Van der Heijden, “Into the trading zone” / *Digital Humanities Quarterly* 2020

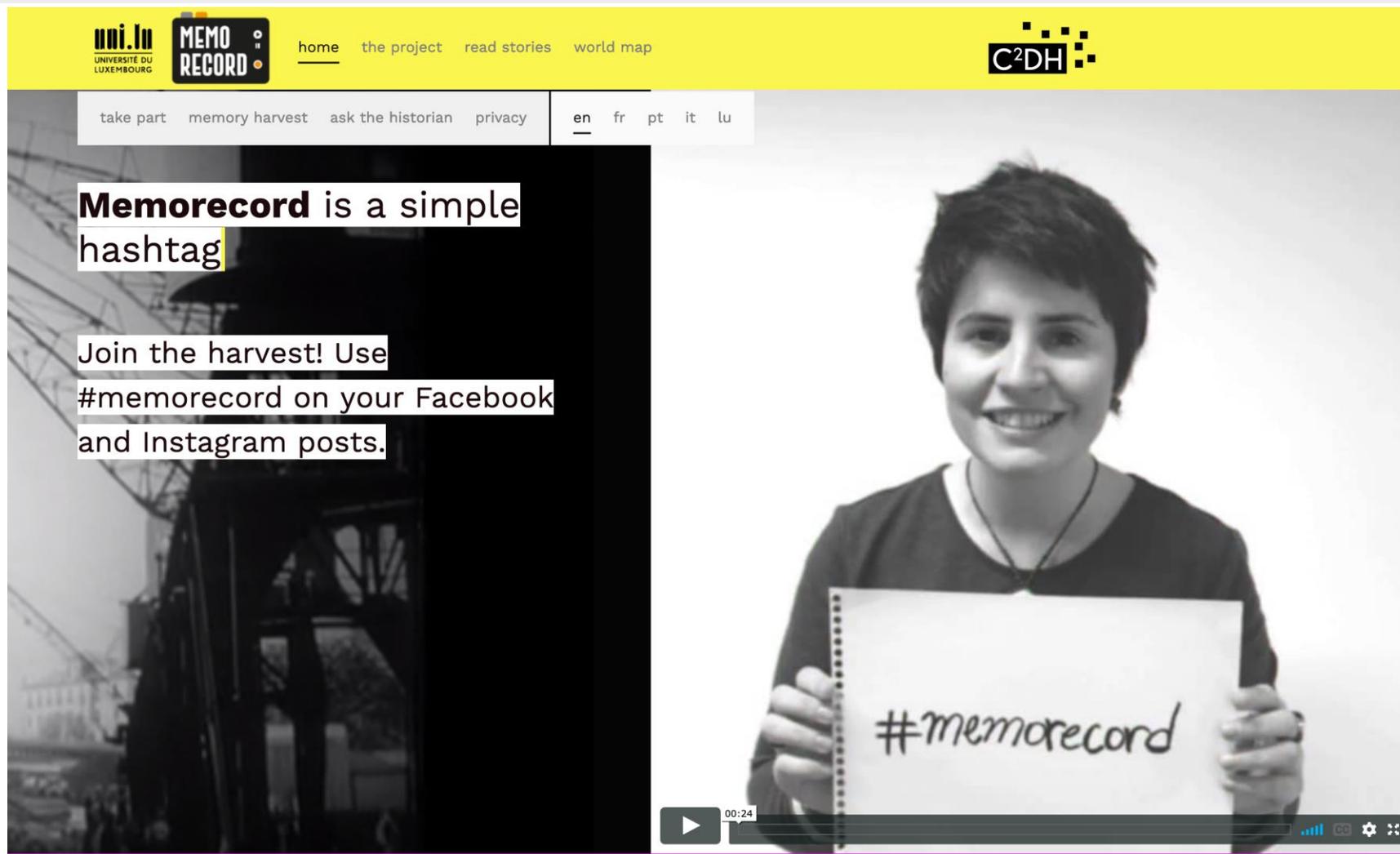
Pragmatic framing

Still some challenges...

- Developing multi-modal literacy in an interdisciplinary setting comes with a prize: it asks for a serious engagement in communication (inter-language), skills (trainings), and curiosity (leaving the comfort zone).
- Tading zones have to cope with “centrifugal forces” (example of DTU): interdisciplinarity not only a challenge for students, but for supervisors!
- The public history element of many research projects at C²DH ask for a professional project management and “double engagement” of the involved researchers (need for concise time management and recognition/reward system)

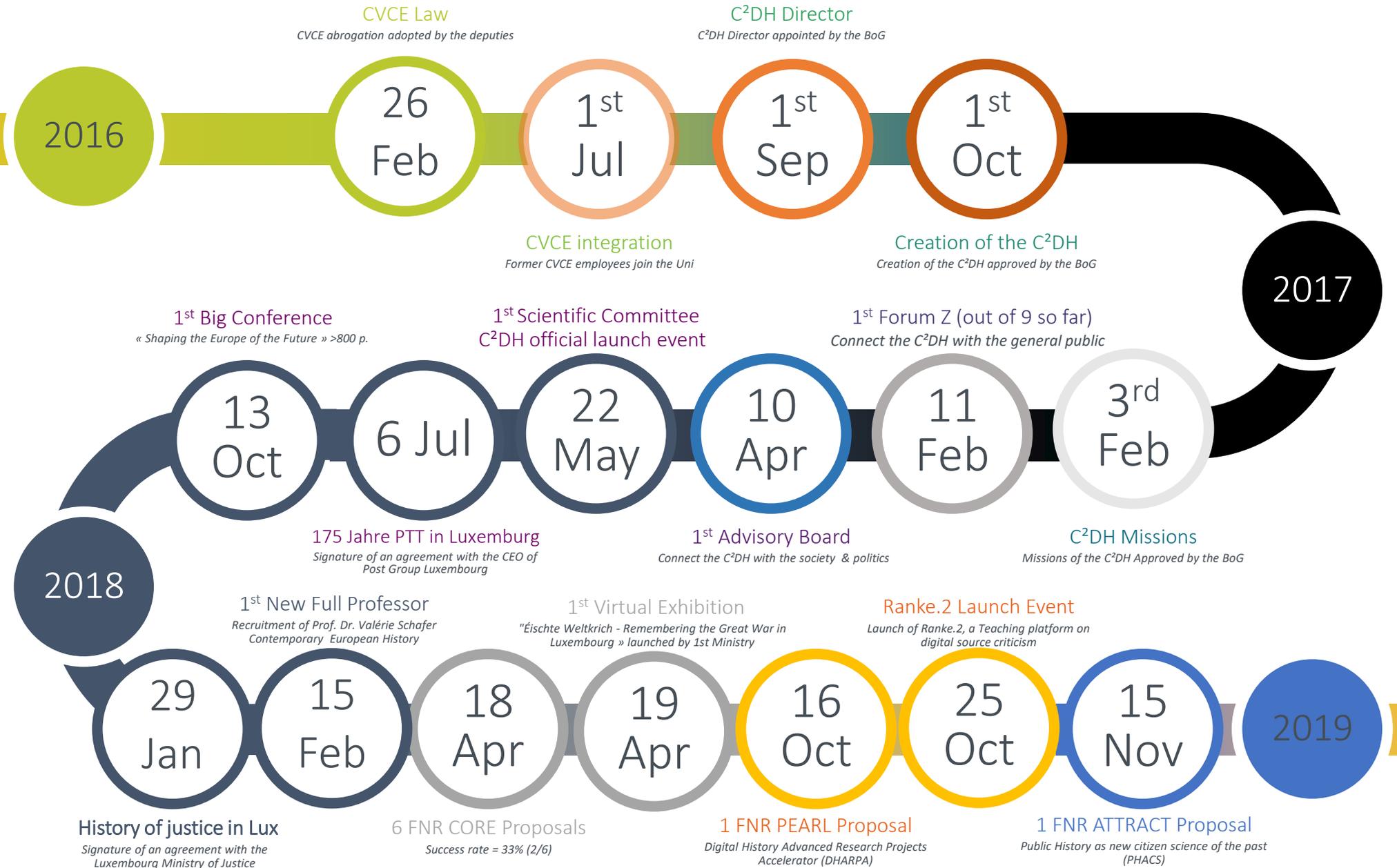
Still some challenges...
